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ABOUT THE AUDRE LORDE PROJECT

HISTORY

The Audre Lorde Project (ALP) is a newly-created Center for Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Two-Spirit, and Transgender People of Color Communities. Initiated as an organizing effort by a coalition of Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Two-Spirit, and Transgender (LGBTST) People of Color, The Audre Lorde Project was first brought together by Advocates for Gay Men of Color (a multi-racial network of gay men of color HIV policy advocates) in 1994. The vision for ALP grew out of the expressed need for innovative and unified community strategies to address the multiple issues impacting LGBTST People of Color communities. ALP secured and moved into its Fort Greene home, in the parish house of the Lafayette Avenue Presbyterian Church, during the summer of 1996.

MISSION

ALP seeks to promote and ensure the physical, mental, spiritual, and political health of Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Two Spirit, and Transgender People of Color in the New York City area.

GUIDING PRINCIPLES

The principles guiding the work and development of The Audre Lorde Project as a progressive organization seeking social justice are as follows:

Recognizing the full diversity of Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Two-Spirit, and Transgender People of Color, and our collective histories of struggle against discrimination and other forms of oppression, the Audre Lorde Project has been established to serve as a home base that LGBTST peoples of African/Black/Caribbean, Arab, Asian, & Pacific Islander, Latina/o, and Native/Indigenous descent can use to organize, support, and advocate for our diverse communities.

As such, ALP seeks to work with LGBTST people of color organizations, and communities across differences of race/ethnicity, culture, gender, sexual orientation, age, ability, and life experiences (e.g. class, immigration status, HIV serostatus, health status, etc.) in order to develop and implement culturally specific and effective programs and services reflecting the needs of our communities.

Understanding that services and organizing efforts are most successful when they involve the communities served, ALP is committed to creating and supporting decisionmaking/organizational structures that are representative of our communities.

Believing that competent skills and expertise in LGBTST people of color communities exist and are often underutilized, ALP seeks to support and promote the work of existing and emerging LGBTST people of color organizations, as well as the efforts of LGBTST people of color cultural workers and activists.

Finally, as an organization seeking social and economic justice for all peoples, ALP is committed to promoting multi-racial coalition-building, advocacy and community organizing activities among LGBTST people of color, and with allies in struggles for equality and liberation.

Whatever path you've taken, if you're over fifty (or approaching), you are a member of a dramatically fast growing community in New York City. The GRIOT Circle: a gathering of Elders, is an inter-generational and culturally diverse community-based social service organization responsive to the realities of life for older lesbian, gay, bisexual, two-spirit and trangender persons of color. It is one of the first incubator projects of The Audre Lorde Project. It exists and is growing.

A multi-racial planning committee of seven LGBTST elders began organizing in 1996 to create a social and culturally comfortable space which would be housed in a You are an Elder fifty years of age or over and a geographical location that was central to your life. Their organizing was prompted by the realization that in this city where social service centers number in the hundreds, and where only two exist for elders who are LGBTST, there was for people of color, not one center. The activists who have You depend on your invisibility for survival, but organized The Griot Circle range from fifty to seventy years of age, its existence is therefore central to their social and cultural survival (and critical to the healthy sustainability of all of our communities in the coming years). The planning committee members include: a founder of a gay social club which has been in existence for more than forty years, twolong term members of lesbian softball leagues, two active labor organizers, and two who are involved in social support, and life experiences have helped to networking. They relied on their experience in grassroots organizing and personal resources to spread the word, and had an attendance of thirty - forty elders at its first two meetings.

> The GRIOT Circle answers your need to find a safe space which provides social and emotional support services and which affirms age, gender, racial, spiritual, and ethnic origins, areas of social service which are not completely addressed by mainstream social service organizations. Its planned outreach methods include networking for referrals through SAGE/Queens, The PRIDE Senior Network, Gay Men of African Descent (GMAD), ADODI (a national gay men's organization), and Unity Fellowship Church, NY. The GRIOT Circle is in the process of establishing contact with Asian/Pacific Islander, Latina/Latino, Native American, and other people of color LGBTST groups, and social service organizations that serve the elder community to advise them of its availability, and its programs.

The GRIOT Circle plans to offer the following types of programming: education/recreation; telephone reassurance; therapeutic intervention; case-management assistance; referral services, friendly visits, newsletter, and outreach. Its policies are inclusive, however the GRIOT Circle's paramount goal is to provide space unique in its provision of socially, culturally, and ethnically comfortable programs for elder (fifty years and over) LGBTST People of Color and their peers. The collaborative efforts of the activists who have started The Griot Circle ensures that the lives of elder LGBTST people of color will be supported in a responsive organization, and will be shared with all LGBTST people of color communities. The GRIOT Circle holds events on the second Saturday of every month, and additional meetings during the week. If you can see yourself as a griot, a storyteller, a celebrator, a historian of a culture forced by society to be invisible, then you need to be involved with The GRIOT Circle.

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

MSM/WSW OF COLOR OUTREACH WORKING GROUP

This coalition of over 18 programs/organizations, that are funded to provide targeted HIV outreach to Men who have Sex with Men (MSM), Women who have Sex with Women (WSW), and self-identified Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Two Spirit and Transgender People of Color in New York City, met for the first time in December 1996. The idea originated from conversations between three programs/organizations: The Audre Lorde Project, Verite and People of COLOR in Crisis (POCC). HIV-related program staff at these agencies felt that existing HIV-related outreach efforts to MSM/WSW of Color throughout New York city were insufficient, low priority in most agencies, and in need of tremendous support. Agencies contacted to join the process were enthusiastic about the idea and joined the Working Group. Important work has been generated by this coalition, including a preliminary assessment of the present state of HIV-related outreach strategies targeting MSM/WSW of Color in New York City.

The Working Group meets on the third Tuesday of each month . Although The Audre Lorde Project coordinates the Working Group, meetings are rotated at each of the member group sites. Programs/organizations involved in the Working Group to date include: AIDS Center for Queens County (ACQC), Alianza Dominicana, American Indian Community House/HIV Project (AICH), Asian and Pacific Islander Coalition on HIV/AIDS (APICHA), Gay Men of African Descent (GMAD), Haitian Community Health Information and Referral Center, Harlem United, Hispanic AIDS Forum/Entre Hombres, Hope Program of the Center for Children & Families, House of Latex (GMHC), Men of Color AIDS Program of the New York City Department of Health (MOCA), Minority Task Force on AIDS (MTFA), People of Color in Crisis (POCC), Shades of Lavender, Steinway Child & Family Services Center, Sub-Sahara AIDS Rescue, Verite, and Young Adults Against Drugs and Alcohol (YAADA).

THE STATE OF HIV/AIDS IN THE LESBIAN, GAY, BISEXUAL, TWO SPIRIT AND TRANSGENDER COMMUNITIES OF COLOR

Four community-wide forums assessing "The State of HIV/AIDS in LGBTST Communities of Color", have been hosted at the Audre Lorde Project since February, 1997. Over 20 LGBTST people of color activists, health providers and community members have presented at the various panels/ moderated discussions assessing the state of the pandemic within our various communities. While there are distinct concerns among the various communities that have been presented to date, a thread of common sites of struggle have also emerged, including: the continued lack of culturally and linguistically specific strategies targeting LGBTST People of Color communities in New York City; lack of coordination among AIDS Service Organizations and other community-based organizations (including religious institutions); ongoing denial of the realities and challenges faced by lesbians, bisexual women and people of transgender experience who are living with, or affected by HIV/AIDS; and the need to integrate any meaningful HIV-related strategies with other community-building efforts. Forums presented to date have examined the state of HIV/AIDS in LGBTST communities of African descent, Latina/o descent, Women's (Lesbian, Bisexual, Transgender) communities, and Asian & Pacific Islander communities. Over 30 organizations have joined us by co-sponsoring individual events.
