Such is the character of the witness on whose testimony and that of a negro named Lacy Smith, who lodged and slept in the same bed with "Frances Thompson," Mesers. Washbura and Broomall, Republican members of a cougresxional investigating commitee to inquire into cortain alleged notous proceedings in the city of Memphis, in the jear 1866, made report that "the crowning acts of atrocity and diabolism coumitted were the ravishing of five colored wourn." The rape of "Frances Thompson," Mesprs. Washburn aud Broomall go on to say, "ik one to which reference is lere made." After starting, according to the testimony of "Frances Thompson," that seven men, who had policemen's stars on their breasta and who were "all Irishmen," had on a certain aight entered the house of said "Frances Thompson," Messrs. Washburn and Broomall declare that "the woman, Frances Thompson, was then violated by four of the men, and so badly beaten and bruised that she lay in bed for three days." The testimony of "Frances Thompson," on which Messrs. Washbura and Broomall base their statements may be fuund on pages 196 and 197 of their report.
