Fan dancer Sally Rand. who streaked to fame at her Nude Ranch at the 1939 International Exposition at Treasure Island, pranced back into town today to help an old friend.

Sally will star at a variety show and dance March 29 at California Hall to finance sex-change surgery for her friend, hairdresser Kenneth Marlowe who prefers to be called Kate and wears clothing in keeping with that

"I've known Kate for 30 years," Sally said as she sat with her friend at a breakfast table at the Gazebo Cafe. "I've always thought of him as a girl."

Asked how she felt about the forthcoming surgery, Sally said:

"If a girl wants to be a girl, why shouldn't she be a girl?"

"That's just the way I feel," Kate added.

Sally said Kate would live in Rome after the operation. "Even being pinched is fun in Rome," she observed.

"I just can't wait," Kate responded.

Sally came prepared for a revisit to Treasure Island, the scene of her early triumph on the Exposition midway.

She wore a navy blue outfit with pleated skirt and a

woman who masqueraded as a soldier

More than one woman of the American Revolution fired a gun in a battle emergency. One established her name in history by masquerading as a man and serving without detection for a year and a half

A booklet titled "Women and the American Revolution", published by the national Daughters of the American Revolution, tells the story of Deborah Sampson who enlisted in the Fourth Massachusetts Regiment of the Continental Army under the name of Robert Shurtleff. She was wounded at Tarrytown, was honorably discharged and granted a pension for her military service. After her death, the husband she later married became "the first man granted a pension by the U.S. government for the military service performed by his wife."

The booklet continues her story "Deborah Sampson alias Robert Shurtleff was five feet seven inches in height (taller than most women), with an erect carriage and strong features. To hide her sex, she had bound her breasts tightly. The men in her company teased her about not having to shave but they thought this was because she was so young.

"SHE WAS physically strong and performed a soldier's duties as well as the men with whom she served, so no one suspected that she was a woman. Her secret would be safe unless she needed medical attention.

"So when she was wounded - in the left thigh, just below the groin - she did not go to see the doctor but extracted the bullet herself. (After Deborah's death, a woman who lived in her household for forty-six years testified that the buflet had never been removed.)

"Deborah's sex was finally discovered by Dr. Barnabas Binney who attended her in Philadelphia, where she was hospitalized with a fever. He did not reveal her secret but quietly made the necessary arrangements that ended her military service. Private Robert Shurtleff was honorably discharged from the United States

Army by General Henry Knox at West Point on October 23, 1783."

The first wonth to receive a pension from the government was a 25-year-old camp follower who took over her husband's position at a small cannon when he was killed in baltle. The "Four Traditions" bulletin from the New York State Bicentennial Commission describes the action this way:

"IT WAS A vumerable position (Margaret's replacement of her dead husband), and she too was soon wounded. One of her arms was almost severed and a breast was badly lacerated by grapeshot. She was moved to Philadelpnia with other casualties and assigned to the Invalid Corps.

"Recognizing that her wounds would leave her permaneraly crippled, Congress acknowledged her allantry by awarding her a pension of harf-pay and 'one compleat suit of cloaths annually for the rest of her life." The resolution to award her this pension was passed by the Continental Congress on July 5. 1779. - ELLEN

Men who want to become women need Casablanca for their sexchange surgery as author

James Morris did. One-time correspondent for The Times of London and The Guardian of Manchester, Morris wrote

Conundrum, which describes his transition from man to woman following his operation in Casablanca.

The trans-sexual operation he underwent is available at no cost in Australia. It comes under the heading of free medi-cal benefits. In Sydney, a special 4-man panel of medical experts processes all such applications. In the past three years, of 40 candidates for trans-sexual operations, 17 have been operated on and changed into women.
