Being a 'closet transvestite' is the most worrying, guilt-ridden, frightening and incredibly lonely thing in the world. Merely making contact with others brings tremendous relief. Despite any 'caustic comments' which have been made, or might be made in the future, the nine Mensans who have established contact with the Group make my article worthwhile—I know that we have helped them.

The Group welcomes and encourages contact with those outside our little world. but it is not recruiting, seeking converts, or promoting transvestism as an alternative sport; it is seeking to help people in trouble. There are thousands; many more than there are Mensans-look at the "Problem Pages" in newspapers and magazines, it crops up with monotonous regularity. The progress made by the Group is reflected by the fact that nearly all of the 'Agony Aunts' now refer writers direct to us. Nor is our concern merely for the transvestite herself: it is also for the wife, mother, or other person who has discovered their 'perversion'. They are often terribly shocked by the discovery; a shock aggravated by the many misconceptions and prejudices about transvestism

The Group holds very strong views on the protection of children. Our advice to the transvestite with a young family is always the same. "Do NOT dress in front of the children!" We are more painfully conscious than most how easily the mind of a small child can be confused; many of us have been suffering such confusion and agony of mind for a lifetime!

I must confess that I have never regarded this journal as a 'family magazine'. I thought that it was a forum for the highly intelligent. If such subjects cannot be discussed in these pages without hands ng raised in horror, where then can they
