



## ALP'S FIRST MAJOR DONOR COCKTAIL RECEPTION

On December 10th, 1998, over fifty individuals met to celebrate the inauguration of The Audre Lorde Project Major Donor Program. Community members, major donors, ALP Board, staff and volunteers assembled at NYU's Asian/Pacific/American Studies Gallery for a festive cocktail reception. Major donors are individuals who have made an annual contribution of \$500 or more to ALP. Co-hosted by the NYU A/P/A Studies Program, the event was well-attended and had a short and simple program. Former board co-chairs Chandan Reddy and Cathy Cohen welcomed the attendees and provided a brief history of The Audre Lorde Project. They acknowledged the organization's founders and thanked the host committee for a job well done.

John Wright, an ALP founder, spoke of the vital need to support our lesbian, gay, bisexual, two spirit and transgender people of color community institutions. He also spoke of the importance of individual giving at higher levels. He stressed the possibility of interested individuals supporting ALP by making a substantial financial contribution. Only by personally prioritizing our community institutions through individual donations, can we assure the success of such ALP projects like 'Arms Akimbo' (the first LBTST women of color organizing conference in NYC) and 'Transworld' (the first Transgender people of color conference). Finally Executive Director Joo-Hyun Kang thanked all those who worked on the event. Among the evening's attendees were State Senator Tom Duane, NYC Public Advocate Mark Green and City Councilmember Phil Reed.

# SPOTLIGHT ON INCUBATOR PROJECTS

## IBAN/QKNY: Building Queer Korean Community by Pauline Park



Iban/Queer Koreans of New York is a social, discussion, and support group and political advocacy organization for lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgendered Koreans, Korean Americans, and Korean adoptees. The group emerged in the

wake of the November 2, 1996 Korean LGBT Forum co-sponsored by the Korean Gay Organization/Chinkusa, the Committee Against Anti-Asian Violence and The Audre Lorde Project and hosted by the Korean American Association of Greater New York. Iban/QKNY, which began as a small group of friends, is actively engaged in the process of constructing a queer Korean community here in New York City.

Since its founding, the organization has sent a contingent of seven members to KAS-CON, a national Korean American student conference held at Yale in March 1998; produced a 12 page bilingual newsletter in June 1998; and held a Pride Month reception, which attracted over 120 people, including some non-Koreans. In November, the organization co-hosted a party with Chingusai-NY, a group of Korean speaking gay men. Iban/QKNY is also a co-sponsor of the new and popular Asian women's gatherings organized by Persimmon Space. As a participant in ALP's Incubator program, Iban/QKNY held a strategic planning retreat at ALP at the end of January, facilitated by Veronica Flores.

## MOTHER'S 911 CALL ENDS IN POLICE PUSH-IN, UNLAWFUL ARRESTS AND BRUTALITY IN NYPD'S CONTINUED VIOLENCE AGAINST PEOPLE OF TRANSGENDER EXPERIENCE AND PEOPLE OF COLOR

ALP's Working Group on Police Violence has been working with the National Congress for Puerto Rican Rights and others to demand justice for victims of a pre-Thanksgiving police push-in to the home of a Bronx family.

A November 24th 911 call for assistance placed by Nancy Lamot, mother of Jalea Lamot, ended in havoc when police officers from the 42nd precinct became aware that Jalea is a transgender woman. Although paramedics had already left the home of Nancy Lamot when they realized that Jalea was fine, police officers pushed their way into the apartment and proceeded to forcibly remove Jalea, while macing and assaulting others present, including Nancy Lamot, her son John Baez, Jalea Lamot, friend of the family Ricardo Perez, and 2 small children. Nancy, John and Ricardo were arrested with multiple charges. Nancy suffered an epileptic attack during the arrest. Jalea was forcibly taken to a hospital and kept there overnight against her will. Jalea suffered physical and verbal abuse, including racist and homophobic/transphobic epithets. Others at the scene also suffered physical abuse at the hands of police. Nancy's apartment was ransacked, and several pieces of her personal property were destroyed. In a cruel twist to this incident, it turns out that John (Jalea's brother) is a distant relative of Anthony Baez.

Representatives of the Bronx District Attorney's Office met with the lawyer working on this case on January 7th, and agreed to adjourn the case until March 8th. They also committed to conduct a preliminary investigation into the case, including the conduct of officers involved. Feeling harrassed by police, the family returns to court in March.
